Big Island Amateur Radio Club General Meeting June 14, 2008

Meeting was opened at 2:05 PM by President Fred KH7Y. Sign in sheet was passed around and will be attached to these minutes.

A moment of silence was held for Harry Barnes KH6QM who passed away on June 8, 2008.

Introductions were made by all attending.

Secretary's report was approved as written in the newsletter.

Treasurer's report was given by Ron AH6HN. Balance on hand \$2,071.35 and we have 103 members.

Barbara gave a report on the KH6 QSL Bureau. During the month of May there were 2,022 cards received, 9 envelopes of cards returned as undeliverable with 106 cards. There are 38 hams requesting No Bureau cards. Expenses for May totaled \$75.90 of which \$12.38 was paid for by ham credits which left a balance of \$63.52 for ARRL. Balance in the checkbook is \$828.73.

Field Day preparations were discussed. Paul WH7BR the chairman of Field Day is on the mainland so Fred KH7Y led the discussion. It was decided that instead of just one radio operating that we will use two and also have the GOTA station. A satellite station will also be used. This changes our classification to 2A. Fred took a count of how many would be there and how many would be operating so that they would have an idea of how many steaks they might need for dinner. Fred said that he will alert the Flight Service Station about the 90' height and location of the antenna tower. Radios that are being used must be computer

compatible for logging. There is 450' of coax cable available. Coffee pot will be available for coffee. Soda and water will be provided by the club. Dinner will be held between 3-4PM. Generators and solar panels will supply power. Curt AH6RE is taking care of the logging programs. Bob AH6J had a table of information on display to show us what will be used for the display table on Field Day. Fred KH7Y had a copy of the Official press release being sent to the newspaper. Testing for ham licenses or upgrades will be held at 10:31 AM sharp. Setup will begin at 7AM with operating starting around 8AM. We will operate for 27 hours.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:55PM. Social time and refreshments followed.

June 1 is the official start of the Hurricane season in the central Pacific. Make sure you have an emergency package prepared and have a plan of action for the various disaster scenarios possible in these islands. If a hurricane or other disaster hit, you may also be a victim so try to minimize your exposure and be prepared to help yourself as well as others.

Kevin Bogan, our section Emergency Coordinator, said the Makani Pahili hurricane exercise was mostly held Saturday May 24th, however there were several events held earlier in the week by different agencies. The simulated Hurricane would have passed 140 degrees west and entered Central Pacific waters on Wednesday May 21. 

The FCC released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Order (NPRM) on May 8 seeking to raise fees for Amateur Radio vanity call signs. Currently, a vanity call sign costs \$11.70 and is good for 10 years; the new fee, if the FCC plan goes through, will go up to \$12.30 for 10 years, an increase of \$0.60. The FCC is authorized by the Communications Act of 1934 (as amended) to collect vanity call sign fees to recover the costs associated with that program. The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new term.

BIARC Radio Contest News

The big event of the past month was the CQ WPX CW. Bill KH7B entered in the single operator single band 20m category, with 1718 QSOs and 772 prefixes for a total of 3,776,780 points. Bill reports an outstanding opening to EU on Saturday night. Lloyd KH6LC and co-conspirators Ken N6KB, Rob NH6V, Fred KH7Y, and Curt AH6RE operated Lloyd's station as NH6V and brought in 3364 QSOs and 815 prefixes for 10,955,230 points, a significant score improvement over last year. Lloyd's crew saw tough conditions on 160, 80, and 10 meters but the great 20 meter opening on Saturday night partly compensated, and over the 48 hour contest period NH6V worked 98 DXCC entities.
