

Field Day is Saturday, June 28

Focus is on all that makes ham radio great

When a disaster comes to town, and all else fails, it's amateur radio operators who often save the day.

When the power goes out, cell towers crash, the Internet is offline, and other forms of communications fail, it's hams who provide vital links between the populace in a predicament and public officials needing to know what's going on so they can best act in the people's interest.

Hams self-mobilize to help during hurricanes as witnessed during Hawaii's devastating Iwa and Iniki storms — earthquakes, tsunamis, wildfires and just about any other emergency you can imagine. In tribute to Big Isle hams, Mayor Billy Kenoi proclaimed June 23-29 as "Amateur Radio Week" in Hawaii County, and encourages the public to support American Radio Relay League (ARRL) Field Day events slated Saturday, June 28, when amateur radio club operators will set up and demonstrate emergency communications equipment and skills.

In Hilo, the public is invited to activities hosted by the Big Island Amateur Radio Club (BIARC) from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at Walmart.



The membership gathered at the usual time on June 14 for the traditional June prepping session for Field Day. It's one of the two months in the year when BIARC gathers without a business meeting. The other is December, when the Christmas party takes the place of the

regular meeting.

President Bill Hanson, NOCAN, convened the June session at 2 p.m., focusing on the upcoming June 28 Field Day in Hilo and Fourth of July plans for the club in Volcano. Vice President Milt gave a presentation on the N1MM Field Day computer log-in system that will be used for high-frequency contacts. (N1MM Logger is the world's most popular ham radio contest logging program. It's used for CW, phone and digital modes).

Prior to that, however, he paid tribute to Flag Day, celebrated each June 14 across America. Milt showed a poignant and humorous short film about two war veterans from different branches of the military and of different races — who discovered, after

Bill gave an overview of what's in store for the community from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Field Day. Next to the Walmart entrance, 5 tables will be set up: 1) BIARC/ARRL; 2) radio table, with VHF/UHF and HF; 3) digital ops, headed by Harvey Motomura, AH6JA; 4) interactive opportunities, with Morse Code and GMRS radio; 5) parter table, with reps from Walmart, CERT, etc. Plus, at the entry to the garden area, HELCO and BIARC will have a display.

Bill said 24-hour activities at Wailoa Center have been cancelled, since we haven't been able to acquire the necessary insurance coverage. Milt volunteered that the FCC VE testing could be held at the Kilauea LDS Church and Bill

said the potluck dinner will be held, instead, at Keaau Community Center.

(Subsequently, however, the original Field Day plans were reinstated after Treasurer George Bezilla plowed through the bureaucratic mine field and arranged for proper insurance coverage at Wailoa Center.

And Bill asked Robert Oliver to chair the 24-hour HF activities there. The potluck dinner will be at 6 p.m. at Wailoa, and the VE testing will be held there at 1 p.m. for all FCC Amateur Radio licenses.)

Milt said Joe Speroni, AH0A, will be the speaker at the July meeting, at 2 p.m. Saturday, July 12, at the Keaau Community Center.

Mary Brewer, who is chairing Volcano Fourth of July activities, invited all BIARC members to participate. BI-ARC will be in the parade. Let Bill know if you want to join

in. Parade units report to the Volcano Post Office at 8 a.m. and access roads will be closed at 8:15 a.m. in preparation for the 9 a.m. parade from the P.O. to Cooper Center on Wright Road, where Independence Day activities for all ages will be in full swing from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Mary said there will be a table manned by the Red Cross, CERT and ARES. If you want to help out, call her at 985-9595, or email hereforthejourney@msn.com.

The Volcano CERT team will help out by providing communications along the parade route and throughout the village on 146.49 simplex.

After the parade, there will be a 4th of July potluck picnic on the lawn of the Wright Road home of Doug Wilson and Linda Quarberg. See article later in the newsletter for details.

Radio transmission activities also are scheduled from 8 a.m. that Saturday until 8 a.m. Sunday at Wailoa Center.

For 24 hours, radio operators will make contacts with other hams throughout the Pacific and North America.

"'Amateur Radio Week' recognizes the miracle of radio transmissions over the airwaves and the accomplishments of amateur radio operators worldwide," Kenoi said, noting this summer marks the centennial anniversary of ARRL, the leading organization for amateur radio in the United States.

"Amateur radio operators have provided countless hours of community services throughout these decades, and have also provided a bridge between people, societies and countries by creating friendships and the sharing of ideas," Kenoi stated in the proclamation.

Of the 717,201 amateur radio operators — also known as hams — in the U.S., there are 4,550 in the ARRL Pacific Section, which includes Hawaii, Guam, American Samoa and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. Of these, 3,550 are in the state of Hawaii.

"Amateur Radio Week" will culminate with the ARRL Field Day operating event that simulates setting up a station in the field, and operating 24 hours to polish communications skills vital to emergency operations. Amateur radio clubs throughout the U.S., Canada and the Pacific will set up transmitters to demonstrate emergency radio communications.

"In recognition of this important emergency preparedness exercise, I encourage all citizens to pay tribute to the amateur radio operators and their role in keeping us informed in times of emergency," Kenoi said.

BIARC President Bill Hanson invites people of all ages to stop by Hilo Walmart on June 28 to join in hands-on demos and lots of other activities — get info on emergency communications, how to put together a grab-and-go bag and how to learn more or take a ham radio class.

And at Wailoa Center, ham operators will be contacting other hams around the world around the clock on high-frequency radios.

Volunteers from other agencies linked to emergency preparedness also will participate, including Hawaii County Civil Defense, American Red Cross-Hawaii, Community Emergency Response Teams and volunteers planning the Aug. 30 second annual Puna Regional Emergency Preparedness Fair in Keaau.

At 1 p.m.on Saturday, testing also will be offered for all FCC ham licenses at Wailoa Center.

Old Rusty Submarine is in port


Corky Kirk, W6ORS, focus of more than one island ham radio legend, was spotted at the June 14 meeting.

When his friend saw him, he said: "You look like you've had a stroke."

Next thing Corky knew, he was in the hospital for a week, followed by a week in a support facility. Then his daughter took him to a nursing home in Pasadena. After about 3 months, ORS had had about enough of that, so he "escaped" and headed back home to Hilo.

Corky, who also has a place in Volcano, has been a ham since 1951. He'll be 90 in July. He picked the Old Rusty Submarine monicker because he served on submarines in both the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans in World War II. His father served on submarines in WWI.

Ten-Ten International Net's Spirit of 76 set to go

Ten-Ten International Net's Spirit of 76 (7 days, 6 modes) QSO Party will be held from 0001 UTC Monday, June 30, to 2359 UTC July 6, Sunday. Make as many contacts as you can during the week using 6 modes. Here are the modes to use, and suggested frequencies to monitor:

- 1. USB (28.345)
- 2. RTTY (28.086)
- 3. CW (28.050)
- 4. FM (29.600) 5. PSK (28.120)
- 6. AM (29.000)

It will be possible to work the same call 6 times, once in each of the various modes, for a maximum total of 12 points per call sign. All other normal rules apply. Logs must be postmarked before July 21.

Another exciting event, the Ten-Ten Summer Phone QSO Party, will be held from 0001 UTC Saturday, Aug. 2, to 2359 UTC on Sunday, Aug. 3.

Keep 10 meters in use; you have to

make contacts to get results. Do remember, that chapter members within 150 miles of the primary net location of that chapter may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. The Aloha Chapter is centered now on Pahoa!

centered now on Pahoa!
Remember: "Monitor" means you make an initial contact on the suggested frequency, then QSY, or change, to a nearby frequency to continue your contact. This ensures that others can use the monitor frequency to establish contact and then do the same.

A high frequency ARES net meets every week on 7.088.0 on Tuesday at 7 p.m. Alternate frequencies are 3.993.5 and 1.870 MHz. Digital nets are held at 8 p.m. HST Tuesdays, UHF once a month, then two weeks later, VHF. The last UHF digital net was held June 10.
